



**s. Gladys Bosire,** a staff member of the Botswana Education Magazine takes us through their planning journey of hosting a career fair in Namibia at the Namibian College of Open Learning (NAMCOL). Situated in Gaborone, Botswana the Botswana Education Magazine endeavour to act as a guiding force for education, fostering learning opportunities through bi-monthly publications and inclusive exhibitions, with a steadfast commitment to ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education for all.

Ms Bosire eludes to the primary goals and objectives of hosting this educational career fair, stating that it is to connect students with potential employers, provide insights into various career paths, and offer guidance on educational opportunities.

The event solely aims at bridging the gap between education and industry, helping students to make informed career decisions and enhancing their employability.

"Our organization has extensive experience in organizing career fairs in various countries. We have previously hosted career fairs in Botswana, Kenya and Zimbabwe and now Namibia" said Ms Bosire.

## Key activities featured during the fair include:

- Career workshops and seminars
- Panel discussions with industry experts
- Networking sessions with employers
- Educational institution exhibits
- Job application and interview preparation sessions
- Interactive career guidance booths
- Experience and Background

Reflecting on success stories, the organiser highlighted some notable achievements from past career fairs having an increased employment rates among participants, successful partnerships between educational institutions and industries. It has also enhanced career awareness and preparedness among students, previous fairs have significantly impacted the education and career landscapes.

To attract a diverse range of exhibitors, the magazine leverage its extensive network and partnerships with educational institutions, industry associations, and professional bodies. It also offer tailored exhibitor packages that highlight the benefits of participating in the fair, such as brand exposure and access to a pool of talented students.

Ms. Bosire explains that to ensure active student participation, they employ several marketing strategies such as: pre-event promotions through schools, colleges, and social media and engaging activities like contests and quizzes with prizes.

Career guidance's being its specialty, the fairs typically also offer counseling services such as one-on-one career counseling sessions, group workshops on career planning and development, information booths with career resources and materials and sessions on job market trends and emerging career opportunities.

Ms Bosire concludes by stating that key takeaways from these events include the importance of tailored career advice, the value of interactive sessions for student engagement, and the significant impact of industry collaboration on the success of the fairs. "Our future plans for the career fair series include, expanding to other African countries, focusing on regions and emerging job markets. We aim to continue fostering industry-education collaborations and enhancing career guidance resources to support students across the continent in their career journeys," she concluded.






Mathews lidipo

### 1. What were the key skills and knowledge you gained during your internship?

My three major skills gain from this internship are working under pressure, adopting to new conditions and problem solving skills. I gain knowledge on how to maintain the earth moving machines among other use full gains.

## 2. Can you describe a specific project or task that significantly contributed to your learning?

I was part of the high wall approach project, in which I learned how to read the pit walls for safety precautions in case of falling rocks or cracks in the pit walls.

7. How can student's best prepare themselves to maximize their learning and contributions during their internships?


During a research about the company before hand and get to know what they stand for, what they deal with and what is expected from their employees.

4. What personal qualities or skills did you discover or develop during your internship?


I discovered and developed communication skills, adoptability and professionalism during my internship. I learned about organisational culture understanding workplace manners and taking responsibility for my tasks.

7. How can student's best prepare themselves to maximize their learning and contributions during their internships?


Students should attend to all jobs given and it should never be about money.
